





The commission received from Thomas Love on account of lease of Opera and Club House at Reliance, amounted to approximately an average of \$150.00 per month, for the months of July to December 1920. Of this amount, the Mine Department has set up a revenue of \$18.00 per month for rent of the buildings, plus \$2.00 for water and actual light and power at the established rate, amounting in total to approximately \$50.00 per month.

In view of the investment of the buildings at Reliance, I do not think the revenue set up by the Mine Department is enough, and would suggest that they charge for the building, at least \$40.00 per month plus the regular rates for water and light. If the commission received does not decrease, and the chances are it will increase, the Mine Department will receive about \$75.00 per month, and the Store Department an equal amount. If this division is satisfactory, please advise me and I will instruct the Mine Superintendent and Storekeeper at Reliance accordingly, effective January 1, 1920. This distribution of course is to be subject to revision, if the commission received

Mr. Brooks -

warrants a redistribution.

At Hanna, the Merchandise Department is receiving an arbitrary amount of \$125.00 per month, which I understand is satisfactory to the Superintendent of Stores, and would suggest that this arrangement be continued.

I have not as yet received figures from Superior for December, but have wired to Mr. Syme and as soon as information is received, will advise you how I think the commission should be divided between the Mine Department and the Store Department.



The following is quoted from the present lease:

- 2. The Lessee agrees to pay to the Lessor for the use of said Opera House building, the following amounts to-wit:
  - (a) 8% of the gross sales or receipts whether for cash, credit or for coupons issued by the Store of the Lessor accruing from the picture show, pool tables, bowling alley, sale of tobacco, soft drinks, newspapers, candy, nuts, ice cream and other merchandise, authorized by the Lessor to be sold on said premises.
  - (b) \$10.00 per month for the space, water and light used in connection with said Barber Shop.
- 7. The Lessor agrees to maintain and keep the said leased premises in a reasonable repair at its own cost and expense. The cost of heating said premises shall be borne solely by the Lessee and the Lessor shall sell the Lessee fuel for such purposes, at the same price charged its employes.

is my understanding that the 8% commission was to cover rental of the building and electricity furnished for lighting and for the operation of Moving Picture Machine. In connection with our investigation of loss on operations of Hanna Electric Light Plant concerning which I will write you fully in a few days, it was found that in addition to the lights, Mr. Love is using electricity for a Carbonator, an Air Compressor, four Heaters, Electric Piano and a Popcorn Machine. I understand that a meter is installed at the Theatre but that the electricity furnished the Club House and appliances installed therein, is not measured. The Mine Superintendent has estimated that the appliances in the Club House including the lamps will use approximately 1,338.9 KW hours per week or 5,738.1 KW hours every thirty days. It is estimated that the heaters alone will use approximately 5,000 KW hours every thirty days.

I find that Mr. Love purchased for use at the Club House, only one ton of coal each month during December 1920, January and February 1921. Evidently Mr. Love is using electricity furnished free by the Company, to heat the Club House, instead of purchasing coal for that purpose. It may be that he was authorized to use electricity for heating purposes, but if so, I have not been advised to that effect.

The Storekeeper at Superior advises that he collected \$40.00 from Thomas Love as rental on the Opera House and Amusement Hall at Superior, for the months of July, August, September and October 1920.

The agreement with Mr. Love specifies that he should pay 8% of all receipts accruing from admissions to the Opera House and sales of merchandise etc. However, on account of the buildings and fixtures not being in such shape that a profitable business could be carried on prior to November 1, you have released Mr. Love from paying 8% on his receipts, requiring him to pay only \$10.00 per month from July 1 to October 31, for use of buildings. Please confirm or correct my understanding of this matter.

For your information, I may state that a check of Mr. Love's business at Superior, shows that his receipts were \$89.09 for July, \$666.71 for August, \$1,632.02 for September and \$1,636.75 for October, of which had the regular commission been collected, the Company would have received \$7.13, \$53.34, \$130.56 and \$130.94, or a total of \$321.97.

I expected to have information in shape to give an opinion as to how the revenue from our Opera Houses and Amusement Halls at Hanna, Reliance and Superior should be divided between Real Estate Department and Merchandise Department. However, I find that at Hanna and Reliance, the maintenance and repairs of these buildings have not been reported separately on Form 30. I have requested the Mine Superintendents to send me a statement showing the amounts expended on these buildings since the leases went into effect, and I expect to have the matter in shape to submit to you by January 1st. In the meantime, I would suggest that the entire \$40.00 collected at Superior in July, August, September and October, be credited to the Real Estate Department.

During November, Mr. Love's receipts at Superior amounted to \$2,344.16, on which the Storekeeper collected commission of 8% or \$187.53. Until a basis of division is arrived at, I would suggest that an arbitrary amount for rental - say \$35.00 or \$40.00, and an estimated amount for light and water, if the exact amount cannot be determined, be credited to the Real Estate Department, the remainder to go to the Merchandise Department. If you agree with me in this, please advise me what amount you think should be credited to the Real Estate Department, and I will advise the Mine Superintendent and Storekeeper how the collections should be handled. Adjustments can be made for November and December business, as soon as an exact basis for division is determined.





Referring to your letter of June 17, suggesting that commission received from Thos. Love, lessee of Opera and Club House at Hanna be divided so that the store will receive an arbitrary amount of \$125.00 per month, and the remainder applied on the light and rent accounts:

Inasmuch as the maintenance, depreciation, taxes, insurance, etc. on this building are charged to the Real Estate Department, it seems to me that an arbitrary amount should be credited for rent, actual amount for light, and the remainder credited to the Store. The buildings cost \$14,000.00, depreciation charges amount to \$43.00 and insurance charges \$5.00 per month. I am unable to figure maintenance or tax charges. We have been charging \$40.00 per month rent, and \$10.00 for the barber shop. Whether or not that is enough I am not prepared to say.

It would perhaps be a more equitable basis of division to credit the Real Estate Department with -

- (1) Actual light and power provided all electricity used in the entire building is measured.
- (2) Commission on admissions to the Opera House, as the Store Department is not concerned in that part of the building.

- (3) An arbitrary amount representing rental for the Club House.
- (4) Rental from Barber Shop (\$10.00 per month)

Such division would leave the Store the commission on merchandise sales, less an arbitrary amount for rental of Club House. This matter is however, left to your judgement, and if you decide that \$125.00 for the Store's proportion should stand, I will issue instructions accordingly.

For May, and I presume for June also, the Mine Department billed for \$40.00 rent, \$10.00 barber shop, and actual amount of light, the store retaining the remainder of the commission.

Have checked these figures over with Mr. Dickinson, Tallmire and Swann and the only discrepancy I find on the cost of proposed building at Rock Springs is that under head listed revenue, you show the rentals by years and the rental paid by the Engineering Department by months. Instead of \$18.00 there should be added an annual rental of \$222.00 making the total rentals \$7,782.00 instead of \$7,578.00.

We have gone into the situation quite fully and also have given consideration to building a storage vault which you may understand has come up annually for the last five years. We develop that a storage vault for dead records for Mr. Tallmire, the Assistant Treasurer, my office and for the Engineering Department would only give us temporary relief as we still would have to give consideration to building a storage vault connected with the Engineering Department for the storage of valuable records which they have at present stored in wooden cupboards and other receptables which constitute a fire hazard. It would be impossible to store these records of the Engineering Department in a common vault on account of the inconvenience of having to go and get these records every time they were required. We figure that to give the necessary vault accommodations to the Engineering Department and also construct a general storage vault would cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000.00.

We now come back to the question of constructing a three story office building, tentative plans of which were made by Mr. Swann about two years ago. I am not advised as to whether or not you are familiar with these plans so I am sending prints to you so that you might look them over.

Mr. Swann estimates that a building of this sort, for a general office building, and accommodations for the Southern Wyoming Electric Company on the ground,

or oper storage facilities for all Departments for both live and dead records.

If we do not construct a building and decide during the present year to build the necessary storage vaults, as has been stated, it will cost \$15,000.00.

We have taken the new building at \$85,000.00, given it a credit of \$15,000.00 for storage vaults, then have taken the \$70,000.00 and developed the following:

\$10,300.00 minus \$9,532.00 leaves a balance in the red for the new building of \$768.00.

There is no doubt but that a great improvement in economies would become apparent by having a general office building and certainly with all of The
Pacific
Union/Coal Company family in one building, working under more favorable conditions,
economies would be accomplished, which would more than offset this apparent deficit
of \$768.00 annually. The old building that Mr. Swann now occupies could no doubt
be rented as a business house or rooming house for a rental large enough to overcome
the apparent annual deficit.

However, giving consideration to all angles of the situation, we feel that instead of starting to work out the details for a building now, on account of

the fact that the budget items must soon be submitted, it would be better if we gave more detailed consideration during the year 1925, as we feel we would then be in a much better position to give intelligent consideration to the whole situation and certainly we cannot be any worse off under the present conditions for another year than we have been for the last five years.

The estimate we made does not include an item of \$20,000.00 which we are now carrying for insurance to cover valuable records in the Engineering Department which may be lost on account of fire. The premium on this amounts to \$200.00 annually. If we had a new building with good fire proof vaults as we contemplate building, this item could be practically cut out. When these items are given consideration, it would seem that we would be justified in building a new building.

WITNESSETH: That in all cases of injury to and of sickness of employees of THE UNION PACIFIC COAL COMPANY including their families at Reliance, Wyoming the said PARTY OF THE SECOND PART for and in consideration of the COVENANTS and AGREEMENTS hereinafter contained agrees to perform all the necessary SURGICAL and MEDICAL services for the treatment of said employees, provided that accidents accrue on the way to and from or in or about the mines, and all diseases that are contracted in the Camp of Reliance. The party of the SECOND PART agrees to furnish all necessary SURGICAL DRESSINGS for the same at his office, or at the home of the employees free of charge to the employee, except for OBSTETRICS, MIDWIFERY (This to include cases of mis-carriage) VENERIAL DISEASES or diseases resulting from INTEMPERANCE and DISEASES CALLING FOR VACCINE or SERUM TREATMENT.

The charges for obstetrics shall be TWENTY FIVE (25.00) DOLLARS; for MIS-CARRIACE TWENTY FIVE (25.00) DOLLARS. The payment of these fees and the first cost to me of the vaccine and serum to be guaranteed by the HOSPITAL COMMISSION.

THE PARTY OF THE FIRST PART agrees to pay to THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART for such services, MEDICINES AND SURGICAL DRESSINGS the sum of TWO (2.00) DOLLARS per capita of all employees at Reliance, Wyoming who shall be assessed for the Hospital Fund upon the pay rolls of the Union Pacific Coal Company.

In all cases THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART agrees to make reports to TME PARTY OF THE FIRST PART and to THE UNION PACIFIC COAL COMPANY and to use all diligence and discretion in ascertaining and recording all facts bearing on the cause of the accident to any and all employees.

The said PARTY OF THE SECOND PART further agrees that in the case of employees transferred to the WYOMING GENERAL HOSPITAL at Rock Springs either for Surgical orMedical treatment, to perform all surgical and medical treatment for said person, and in consideration for the said services THE PARTY OF THE FIRST PART agrees to pay to THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART the amount of THERTY (30.00) DOLLARS per month.

No indebtedness shall be incurred for the Commission of the Union Pacific Coal Company without special permission before contracting the same.

THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART agrees to use all diligence to make known his wherabouts by Telephone or otherwise in the event he is absent from the Camp so that he may at once be located.

THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART agrees to treat all diseases of the EYE, EAR, NOSE or THROAT as lend as the services of a specialist are not needed or required.

It is further understood that THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART shall during all days of the year maintain "OFFICE HOURS" which shall be plainly marked upon the door of his office, excepting the first and third Sundays of the month during the Summer months when the mines are not working but two and three days a week.

This agreement remains in force until April 1, 1927, and maybe terminated at any time for cause upon 30 days notice being given thereo by THE PARTY OF THE FIRST PART to THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART or by similar notice given by THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART.

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the party of the first part is the owner of the certain property in Hanna, Wyoming, upon which is situated an Opera House containing: Club Rooms, Reading Room, Pool Hall, Bowling Alley and Sales Room.

WHEREAS, the party of the second part desires to lease the premises above described, for the purpose of conducting therein a Barber Shop, Pool Hall, Bowling Alley, News Stand, etc. Also for the sale of Tobaccos, Soft Drinks, Candies, Nuts and Ice Cream.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The party of the first part leases to the party of the second part from month to month, beginning on the date of these presents, that certain building in Hanna, Wyoming, known as the Opera House, for the purpose of conducting therein a Moving Picture Show, Barber Shop, Pool Hall, Bowling Alley, News Stand and for the sale of Tobaccos, Soft Drinks, Candy, Nuts and Ice Cream, and said premises shall not be used for any other purpose, nor for the sale of any other articles; that said Opera House and the reading room therein shall be kept in a clean, tidy and sanitary condition. The second party represents to

that the retail price of the commedities sold by him shall not exceed the market price current in Hanna, Wyoming, for the same or similar articles, and the first party has relied upon said representation in making this lease.

It is further agreed that the closing hour for caid business shall be eleven (11) o'clock P.F. on all days except Saturday or day before mine will be idle, when the hour for closing will be midnight, and that no unlawful, improper or offensive une shall be made of the presises.

3. In calculating the percentage of receipts, the basis shall be gross sales or receipts in Hanna, whether the same be for cash or for coupons issued by the first party's store, whether such sales are for cash or for credit, and the same shall be ascertained monthly and paid on the first day of each month. The first party's representative shall have the right to inspect the books of the second party at any time for any purpose connected with this lease.

The party of the second part agrees to accept at par as payment for any article sold by him, or for the rendition of any service in connection with the business above mentioned at Hanna, Wyoming, coupons issued by the first party's store at Hanna, Wyoming, and the party of the first part agrees to redeem said coupons in cash, at par, on the first day of each month following the month in which the same were received.





Mr. N. H. Loomis:

I return herewith agreement between Thomas Love and The Union Pacific Coal Company covering the operation of the Opera House and privileges at Hanna, Wyoming, which was submitted to me with your letter of June 14th.

I observe that the agreement has already been fully executed.

It seems to me from such information as I can gather from the contract itself, that several points may have V been overlooked in drawing it. Very likely the building contains furniture and fixtures which are included in the lease but nothing is said therein about the ownership of such furniture and fixtures nor is there a schedule attached to the lease to identify them. Further, if such personal property is leased, there should be some provision in the agreement imposing upon the Lessee the obligation to give it proper care.

The liability for maintaining and repairing the leased premises should, in my judgment, be defined in the contract.

While a charge of \$10.00 a month is indicated to pay for water and light, nothing is said about the heating and this should also be covered by a suitable provision.

I imagine that the Lessee will continually be exceeding his rights under this lease in the nature of merchandise sold by him as the limitation as to articles to be sold is probably more restricted than was meant. He is specifically prohibited from selling any other articles than those mentioned and those mentioned are tobaccos, soft drinks, candy, nuts and ice cream. This would preclude the sale of fruit and other articles which are usually and properly sold at a refreshment stand.


