

VERDICT IN THE CASE OF J. MORINAGA.

Rock Springs, Wyoming.

Dec. 16, 1904.

We, the Jury duly impaneled and sworn according to law by Mike J. Dankowski, Coroner, in and for Sweetwater County, State of Wyoming, to investigate into the cause of the death of one J. Morinaga: after viewing the body and place of the accident and hearing the testimony of witnesses,

DO FIND: That the said J. Morinaga came to his death about 3:30 o'clock P. M. Dec. 15th, 1904, at the Wyoming General Hospital from injuries received from a fall of rock in No. 3 Entry, No. 2 Plane, of Mine No. 8 Union Pacific Coal Company of Rock Springs, Wyoming. We the jury find that J. Morinaga met his death by carelessness on his own part.

I Haiata being first duly sworn on his oath deposes and says:

Harry Nishiyama--interpreter.

Q Where do you work ?

A No 8 mine

Q What part of the mine do you work in and in what capacity ?

A Third entry as coal miner

Q Working in partnership with Mr. Morinaga ?

A Yes

Q Have him state what you know in regard to the accident and how it happened.

A He was noticed the place looked awful bad but loaded up one more car and then pull out afterwards--try to put prop in and while working in that place the coal fell and he was injured.

Q They knew the roof was bad and unsafe to work under

A His other partner noticed it and did not know himself. He was working in the next room, so he did not know himself

Q Who is his partner?

A The man in the hospital

Q He knew the roof was loose

A His partner is in the hospital. This boy worked in the next room so he did not know in that place

Q Was there any props in the entry?

A Yes in the second trip props there

Q What time was that?

A A little after nine

Q What time did the accident occur

A A little after ten.

Q Did they fire any shots that morning?

A Yes, just the first thing in the morning

Q Did you notice where they put in that shot

A He is working in a different place. He did not see

Q Did he see where they put in that shot?

A No the coal all fell so he could not hardly reach in there where they put the shot in

By Coroner

Q Did they have plenty of empty cars that mornin ?

A Four cars left from yesterday evening and six cars in the morning altogether 10 cars

Q Ask him where the man was that was killed when he got there?

A Right side of the car

Q On the inside or outside ?

A If we walk in from the entry--the right side.

Q On the side close to the coal they were taking down.

A Just right by the coal. They tried to cload the car so he was standing right inside the coal.

Q Ask him if the man was able to talk when he got to him?

A He was in condition to talk but he was in pain so he could hardly explain himself.

B Itaya being first duly sworn on his oath deposes and says:
Q Who is he working for and how long working where he is?
A He worked for 6 months in No 8
Q What part of the mine did he work in yesterday
A Back entry--three entry.
Q Was he working with I Morinaga?
A Yes he was working with him
Q Have him explain as near as possible how this accident occurred
and what the man was doing at the time?
A He is working on the same place and Morinaga worked inside and
he worked on the outside-- one other partner (Man in hospital)
3 men on that place. While they working on that place they
noticed the roof was a little loose. They both tried to run
away at the same time the rock fell and caught Morinaga and
injured him.
Q What was Morinaga doing there at the time the rock fell.
A First time they are loading on this side--when you go in
from the entry--the left side and they noticed the roof in
going loose so they tried to escape from the inside and
run to the outside so he he away around and ran to the out-
side from the right side and he is caught
Q He was around the side of the car when caught?
A Yes the first time he is loading the car on the left side
and every one noticed the roof was going loose so he tried to
go around the empty car and to escape away from the rock
and he is caught on the right side.
Q Ask him if they put in a shot that morning?
A About half past six in the morning they put in a shot
Q Where did they put it in?
A About 3' from the roof.
Q After they put in the shot did they sound the roof
A After they shot down they sounded the roof and they noticed it
was unsafe but they thought it would not come down so soon.
Q They thought it would hold up long enough to load a car and
got caught?
A Yes.
Q Were there any props and caps there?
A Props in on that trip with same car.

K Ozaki being first duly sworn on his oath deposes and says:

Q What is your business

A Coal miners in No 8 mine, No 3 entry

Q How long has he worked there

A About 3 years working in No 8

Q How long has he worked with the man that was injured yesterday

A He knew Morigana over three years but he is working on this entry about 1 1/2 months

Q Have him state all he knows in regard to this accident?

A He is working with I Haiata the first witness. He does know anything about it but when another partner to call for help so he went to their room

Q How far is their room from this entry?

A About 50'.

Q When he got to this entry what was the condition of things there

A The rock was down already when he entered so he tried to help the other partner to take the rock off and helped the patient into the car and pulled it to the outside and go up with him to the hospital.

Geo. B. Pryde being first duly sworn on his oath deposes and says:

Q What is your business?
A Mine foreman, No 8 mine
Q Did Mr. Morinaga work under you?
A He did
Q Where was he working yesterday?
A No 3 entry, No 2 plane
Q How long has he worked in that room, Mr. Pryde?
A I have only been at No 8 since February. He has been working there since I have been there. His partner stated he has been working for the Company 4 years.
Q Were you called in there after the accident occurred?
A I was.
Q What did you find?
A I found that the rock had come down on top of the car.
Q Was Mr. Morinaga still there?
A He was taken outside
Q What was the general condition of this room when you got there?
A Not in good condition
Q Had Morinaga and his partner ordered any props?
A They had ordered props the night before
Q Did they receive them?
A They did the following morning
Q Have you ever been in their room when they put in a shot?
A I have been in their room after they put in a shot and saw where they had put it in.
Q Did you see where the hole had been put in yesterday morning?
A I did
Q Where did they put it in?
A Where the car was standing but on the lower forward corner
Q The left hand side going in?
A How far from the roof?
A Drilled in the roof about 3 inches.
Q What are the rules in regard to putting in a shot of this kind?
A They have been repeatedly warned not to drill holes closer to the roof than 6 or 8 inches

Q Did you notice that hole to-day?
A Yes.
Q Did you notice any drill marks in the room before, where he had been working?
A I did not
Q They knew what the orders were in regard to drilling these holes?
A Oh, yes.

A Co work No 8 mine
Q How long have you worked there?
A Sixteen years
Q Were you in this No 3 entry yesterday
A Yes
Q With Mr. Pryde?
A Mr. Pryde sent me in there to get the cars out as you saw there to-day
Q Did you look around and see where the shot had been put in.
A When I went in, I inspected the room to see if it were safe
After I saw it was safe, I examined all around and saw the drill hole in the roof I sent the partner out to bring Mr. Pryde in and show it to him. He saw where it was. gusses he was satisfied.
Q What are the rules concerning putting in shots in regard to distance from the roof.
A The rules do not cut any figure with these people if you go in where the holes are put to near the roof, they say "Next time we do better." You can not be there all the time with them.
Q What are the rules in regard to shots
A They should be put in different places. Where the roof is good Company men put their holes in about 18" from the roof
Q Did you see any props in this entry?
A Yes
Q Cap pieces also
A Yes.

STATEMENT

December 29th, 1904.

I was riding up on a loaded trip from 7th entry to 2nd entry No. 1 mine on the night of December 24th at 12.30 A.M. at the second entry I went to jump off of trip to go into 2nd north back entry to turn on the syphon that carry water down to station pump at the 6th. When I jumped, my coat caught on wire and jerked me back. My right leg was caught in some way bruising wire it and also my left foot was caught bruising the lower leg. I got up and crawled into where syphons were and turned them on and then went down to 6th to station pump and started pump and pumped all of the water out. At 3 o'clock my leg was paining me a great deal and I went home.

I was riding up on trip to help rope runner to load some material for mine when Jas Bosworth got hurt. He was on one car ahead of me when he went to jump off at 2nd level his coat caught on corner of car and jerked him back against trip and dragged him a few feet. I hollered to rope runner but he could not hear me and when we got to the top I told him, I thought Bosworth had got hurt and we went back down to look for him, but he was had got away from where he was caught so I thought I was mistaken, until I got down to sixth level with material then I found out for sure he was hurt. After we got material unloaded we told him he had better go home as he seemed to be in much pain, and rope runner took him on top on trip and I went home with him to see that he got there alright. Then reported matter to night foreman Wm. Bell. I think it was about 3 o'clock or after when he went home.

Joe Dyett, being first duly sworn on his oath deposes and says:--

- Q What is your name?
A Joe Dyett.
Q What is your business?
A Riding hind end of trips at No 9 Mine.
Q Were you acquainted with John Speis who worked at No 9 Mine?
A No sir.
Q Did you see him the day he got hurt?
A I saw him just after he was run over.
Q State to the jury what you know about this and how you know this man was there?
A When the trip broke in two I got down and turned the lights on the motor road, but the motorman kept going. When I got down around the curve where he got hurt I heard the halloing, and had to walk about 300 feet after I flagged the motorman by hammering on the wires. I went along the left hand side of the trip but did not find him. I then went on the right side and found him.
Q Where was he?
A Under the last cars that were uncoupled from the motor.
Q Did he fall in front of this last part of the trip?
A Under the third car.
Q Was his body under the car?
A Just his legs, a little to one side between the wheels.
Q Could he talk any English?
A I dont think he could.
Q Did he say how he came to be there?
A No, sir. When I found him I went out after the motorman and met him coming in. When I got back there were some who came along and had him out from under the cars. I could not do anything with him myself.
Q Where was it that your trip broke in two?
A Between 43 and 46.
Q Where did you get off to signal the motorman?
A ~~about~~ I t hink it was 36 as near as I can guess.
Q From there you followed the trip down to where?
A I signalled from there, then ran down to where the trip was. I found the trip at 23.
Q That was where you heard the halloing?
A Yes.
Q Did you see any tools on the tracks?
A Yes. They were t his side of 26.
Q How far from where you found him?
A About three rooms
Q How far would that be?
A About 200 feet.
Q Who were there at the trip when you got back there?
A I dont know. There were miners there.
Q What time of the day did this accident occur?
A I believe about half past four.
Q What day was it?
A Thursday I believe, the 22nd.
Q How long have you been riding these trips in that mine?
A About a year.
Q You see quite a few men going out about this time?
A From that time on there were men going out all the time.

A Some days they come uncoupled pretty near every trip. Other days they dont come uncoupled at all.

A Yes, sir.

Q State what he told you about it?

A I went to the hospital with him. I asked him how it happened. He said he came out of the mine early because he wanted to get an order for powder. He said he saw the motor coming, at the same time he stopped to the side until the trip passed. When he saw the last car he started walking in middle of the track. He thought he heard the noise from the cars in front; it was the noise from behind him and he was knocked over. It was about 30 room and the cars shoved him a long time before any car went over him. He did not know how many cars went over him. He thinks 5, but Mr Souleby said only 2, and that it was between 10 and 15 minutes before the first man came to him.

Q Did he say who the first man that got to him was?

A He did not say. He did not know the man.

Q This was all he said to you about the accident?

A Yes.

Q Do you know anything about his family?

A The doctor asked him if he was a family man, and he says no, but before that he said he was married. I heard to-day that he married a widow. She had three children with the first man, so he told he had only a wife and no children.

I was coming out on rear end of motor trip when 12 cars came uncoupled from the trip but it being down grade the 12 cars followed the main part of the trip out but a space between them after the main part of the trip had passed. He must have stepped into the track to walk out not thinking that part of the trip was behind which part had caught him, knocked him down and dragged him about 100'; he stopped the cars, two cars had run over his legs and I heard a man hollowing and I went along the cars and found him laying under the cars. I could not do anything myself to get the man out but I run for the motor man to come and help me but when we got back to him, some of his countrymen had come along and got him out from under the cars so we put him in an empty car and brought him outside of the mine. It was about 23 room where he was lying on the motor road. There was plenty of room for him to get out of the way of the trip. It was a out 4:30 o'clock p.m. when it happened. I don't think anything was to blame for the accident.

While at my labor on said date I saw, while Mr. John Brown was dropping ten empty boxes off the high line, and there were two boxes standing on the block, and Mas. Thomas had just left the car repairer and crossed the slack track right in front of a black steel which was standing, he went and putting one hand on each car and giving a quick spring just at the time the moving cars hit, knocking him from his holds and under the wheel. I started as quick as a flash and commenced to block the cars, and then I goes up to the body and holds the head off the ties until the cars stopped. Both coal and roof got so bad that he was scared it was going to fall and to protect himself he was standing on a Prop. After he got the prop started he found it too long and pulled it out to take a little out of the floor to let it go up into place. When he did this the rock fell and hit him. This is a very bad practice to take a Prop out after it once has been started up to loose roof as it moves the roof up when placed and when taken out the roof comes down to the point where it was, and this movement very often causes it to fall. He ought to have placed another Prop beside the first one and thus saved himself. Plenty of Props on hand and he could have done so. Many a coal miner has lost his life by doing this same thing.

- A. Yes. The turn in the entry trip was clear of the rock that fell if he had hooked on those rocks and pulled them down on the switch if that rock had fell on the ~~SWITCH~~ cars, it would have head it off of him
- Q. Did you take notice of that prop that morning. Was there any occasion of it discharging?
- A. No, the prop seemed to be set not exact plumb, more right angle to the seam, and the post was sunk probably five or six inches in the dirt. It is pretty hard to discharge a post of that kind.
- Q. How far was it from the edge of the rock?
- A. I should judge it would be two ft. or two and a half ft. What makes it look strange to me, I found a piece of 30 lb. iron rail. I don't have any idea why that rail would be there, unless it would be to sound the top to see if the rock was loose. His lamp was found several feet sway from his cap where his body had been, and his arms as I understand were partly out of the rock. He did not have his lamp on his head nor in his hands.

A. Yes, I sent a timberman in there that morning, but they examined the rock the day before. I did not speak to him about that rock that morning. I did not see any danger. We always tell the drivers whenever they see any place that is dangerous to tell the timbermen and have them repair it, and not to go under until it is repaired.

Q. You warned the drivers to do that?

A. Yes.

Q. Did Mike ever speak to you about that place?

A. No. The rock that he had taken down two weeks before that, he had spoken to me about that, so we took this other rock down. The rock I was speaking of is not as thick as that, it was more open, set away from the top a good deal.

Q. Did this driver have any occasion to go that far with his mule?

A. Sometimes there is more than a trip of loads on the switch. There may be more cars on the back end of the switch, so when he turn his horse around to hook on the load, there were three loads on the switch and he did not pull them down. He pulled his entry trip up about oppsite where those three cars were.

Q. You don't know whether the driver had tied his mule?

A. No, I don't. The animal was gentle, and there was no occasion to tie.

Q. How far was the horse run in?

A. I did not see the horse until after he was taken out.

J. McGinnack being first duly sworn on his oath deposes and says:

- Q. Where was you, Jim, when that rock fell?
A. In 34 or 35 room. I went up to see how many cars were loaded, to see which one had the most coal, to get the quickest trip from.
Q. You drive under that rock all the time?
A. No, sir. I do not.
Q. Do you drive on the outside?
A. Some time I have occasion to go through.
Q. Did you know this rock was unsafe?
A. I knew there was a portion, but never supposed as much as there was.
Q. Did you ever see any timbermen examine it?
A. Yes, often. Whenever I noticed a bad rock, I would report it.
Q. Did you report about this rock?
A. They set a post under the rock, and did not pull it down. The one they expected to fall, did not fall. That was down by Pete. I do not know his last name.
Q. Never heard Mike talk about it?
A. No, sir.
Q. He did not seem to be scared to go under?

A. He could not have been waiting. He stopped at 19 or 20 room for water. I could hear his car rattling.
Q. Do you go in there before he starts it?
A. Sure. ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ I WAS IN 34 or 35 room when he got killed. Charlie came running down to me and said, where is the snubber. I said, down at 28 or 29. I would not say for certain. He said, I see the mule up there. I don't see nobody with it. There has been a fall up there. He might be under it. I left my mule standing. We seen a faint glimmer. That was just the way the light was. I said, yes, he might be under there. There is his light. I went running up. I seen his head and shoulder. One half of his shoulder blade was out from the rock. A portion of the rock was on the side of the cars.

- A. I think Mr. Sprowell was what I call a practical miner- a very careful man. He was one of the best miner's I had over there, and I never saw him working where there was any danger. I have sent him into other places where other men would not go into-where they were ~~usually~~ scared to work. He was not afraid of a dangerous place.
- Q. How long has he been in No. 10 ?
- A. Three or four years. Ever since Carbon shut down. Three years anyway. He always seemed to be careful. Of course I was not up there the time he was killed, but when I got there after the accident, one could have seen there should have been sprages put in that coal. I don't think there was any bare place there to be seen, but could not say for sure. I would not say it was carelessness, for I know him to be a very careful man. I would consider that an unavoidable accident. I could not see where any one was to blame or even himself.

J W Patterson

Moses Harvey being first duly sworn on his oath deposes and says:

Q. You was working in the same room as this man?

A. Yes.

Q. You heard the coal fall?

A. Yes.

Q. You knew that there was something the matter?

A. I looked around and there was no light. I run right away right across the room. When I got up there he was lying with his head towards the coal. The right leg was under the coal. He seemed to be doubled right over his left leg.

Q. You think he struck the car?

A. I don't think it. It looked to me as if the coal might have struck him on the back, and when he fell, that cut or gash on the head, he got from falling face down on the coal. There was very little coal on him. There was little around his head, but it seemed to me he was lying with his head down right where his the dent was in his forehead.

Q. His head was not lying where the blood was?

A. His head was right close to the car. That was after we pulled him out. He was doubled right over the left leg, and the right one under the coal.

By Coroner.

Q. You had to break the coal to get it off?

A. Yes. It looked to me as if there might have been a piece of coal where his head struck, and that is what made the dent. It would not look to me that the coal had knocked him there in a minute but I could not say for sure. There was a little coal around his head. His leg was covered with coal. His back was bare. There was some coal on his head but not big pieces—small pieces around his head. I thought when we examined it today, it might have been on the rail or bumper, but they showed no sign of blood. That blood was when we pulled him to there.

Q. How long was you in getting to him?

A. About four seconds, I believe. Just as soon as I looked around, and did not see the light, I run. I think I was there ahead of Barass. (Mr. Barass answered, Yes.) That coal don't come that way very often. That was a remarkable case. I was talking about it about fifteen minutes before. The place seemed alright. It did not seem as if it was working at all.

Q. You did not examine it at all? You don't know whether it was loose?

A. I was not over there at all, but it did not look to me to be loose. He would have done something to it. It must have looked safe to him.

Q. He was generally very careful?

A. Yes.

Q. It just gave one of those bumps?





I examined the room shortly after the accident and found that the cause of his death was probably as stated in Mr. Blake's statement. A piece of the top coal was still hanging to the roof and very loose. It was probably a piece of this overhanging top which fell on Paul.

No request had been made for timber, and from the condition of the room I should say that no timber was necessary. The coal being in this condition should have been taken down by the men before attempting to work under it.

Tackala is unable to write in English, and the attached statement was made up by Mr. Blake by having Tackala's answers to his questions interpreted by Jake Saari. The statement was then read to Tackala in the Finnish language, and was thoroughly understood by him, as stated in the certificate signed by Saari and Hendrickson.

On one occasion at about 2:30 A.M. on the morning May 6th, 05, when I went into the entry to turn on the air, there was some loose coal fell from the top of the cave in roof and brought down the gas and caught a naked light some 30 or 40 feet out in the entry causing the gas to explode and burned me on the hands and face. The entry was in from the slope about 40 feet, and I had brought the miners back from the face while I cleared out the gas.

He gave Bell the air and moved the gas too quick as Bell had a naked light close by which he should not have had at that time, and the gas exploded and burned him causing his injuries.
