Gentlemen:

We are in receipt of your letter of date November 6, 1941, enclosing two prints of Drawing PD-3.

We have marked one print of PD-3 showing center line of the proposed transformer bank in yellow. On the basis of the 1000 amp load, we would require three 125 KVA 2300/220 volt, 2-bushing type transformers, same to be mounted on the concrete mat, all at the expense of The Union Pacific Coal Co. The 220-volt circuit will be carried underground in sheradized steel conduit to your distribution centers.

We do not agree that the tipple operator should control all units. Our plan of operation is that the control console, mounted in the operator's cab over the track-loading location, should control the belt conveyor, the magnetic pulley, and all other equipment in the tipple, including the box-car loader ic pulley, and all other equipment in the tipple, including the box-car loader conveyor. The M. G. set for the magnetic pulley is to be interlocked with the belt conveyor drive so that operation of the belt conveyor is impossible unless the magnetic pulley is in operation.

The control station for the dump house should be located in close proximity to the rotary car dumper, this to include load-car feeder, empty car trip maker, reciprocating plate feeder and double roll crusher. The magnetic intermaker, reciprocating plate feeder to and crusher also between lock should be furnished between the belt conveyor and crusher also between the crusher and reciprocating plate feeder controls.

We have in mind the thought and plan that the crusher must be in operation before starting the plate feeder, also that the belt conveyor be in operation before starting the crusher. In this way the tipple operator can control the operation of the dump station insofar as delivery of coal to the screens by operation of the dump station insofar as delivery of coal to the screens by stopping belt conveyor at any time he sees fit, the stopping of the belt conveyor automatically stopping the crusher and reciprocating plate feeder, which of course would stop coal dumping through the rotary car dumper.

Other than the above mentioned, we agree with your plan of installation.
