Thank you for your list of July 15, 1945, indicating the expected deliveries on the several orders for material for the Stansbury tipple. The list indicates that progress in construction will be determined by the shipment of structural steel, Order No. 1, from the Pan-American Steel Company, and possibly Order No. 2, machinery from Link-Belt.

The indicated date of August 1st, that steel deliveries are expected to start, is later than we had expected from our last advice. However, it would not appear possible that any betterment in delivery can be secured by a better rating on this item. It does, however, appear essential that you keep closely in touch with the Pan-American Steel Company to insure that there will be no further postponement of these deliveries, advising us if this, at any time, appears possible, so that we can, if necessary, attempt to secure better priority.

Our Purchasing Department advises that Order No. 8, from Metropolitan Electric, has all been invoiced, excepting four one and one-quarter inch (12") conduit bushings, 2500 feet No. 10 copper wire, 200 feet No. 1 stranded copper wire, 550 feet of 000 stranded copper wire, and 100 feet of 400,000 circular aill copper wire. None of these items should be needed right away, but it will be well to continue your efforts to secure delivery date. This will apply also to your Orders Nos. 25, 24, 25 and, I believe, No. 26, and any other additional orders which may be necessary.

Enclosed herewith find a list we have prepared, giving the delivery status of material for Stansbury Mine, as of July 13, 1943.

Very sorry we are somewhat late in sending this list to you, but as we wish to be as thorough as possible, we asked all vendors to check with their factories in this matter so that we might have an absolute-ly true picture as of the moment.

You will note that the deliveries of the important material are fairly well in line with the exception of the machinery from Link-Helt and the speed reducers from W. A. Jones. As we told you over the phone, these people have applied an AA-1 rating against these orders and, therefore, cannot better the delivery shown unless they receive an AAA priority rating, in which case delivery can be advanced by a matter of a week or two. The vendors at this time cannot give us a definite advancement in the event of an AAA priority rating as this they claim can only be done when the priority is in their possession, because of the fact that new and high ratings come to them every day and, therefore, their schedule is disrupted daily.

In the above mentioned cases of Link-Belt and W. A. Jones, we have, however, taken the precaution of sending these people a list of the order in which we want the machinery and reducers delivered. This list starts in the Dump House and carries on up the Belt Conveyor to the bay of the Tipple. We have asked them to concentrate on and ship this material first. This will allow us to load mine run coal at least, providing we get the machinery in time. We have also instructed Pan-American Bridge Company to deliver the steel in the above mentioned order and they are concentrating on and fabricating this now.



Please be assured that we will do all we can to hurry deliveries along and will ask for a periodic check on deliveries so that we may at all times know exactly where we stand within the limitations of present day conditions. Kindly check these deliveries yourself and let us know what your reaction is.

I have been contacting the various companies regarding the question of deliveries and priorities with the following results:

Order #1- Pan-American Bridge Company advise that they have their material all on order for delivery in April and May on an AA-3 priority. There is some question as to whether this program will be interferred with and whether it may be necessary to get an AA-2X at the time of the promised delivery date, but as it stands now, everything is in order. The thing that we must look forward to is that WPB may issue a better priority to some one else that may take precedent at the mill and push it out of line. The only thing that would safeguard this somewhat, would be to obtain an AA-2X priority.

Order #3- Robt. Holmes & Bros.- Platework. We discussed this situation with Mr. Holmes who advises that priority AA-3 will be satisfactory for the delivery date of June 1st. However, there is some discussion regarding the motors for the car retarders and these we are attempting to obtain used motors for as they are not totally enclosed, using a standard 1 HP., 1200 RPM. motor.

Order #4- W.A.Jones Fdry.&Mach.Co.- Speed Reducers.
The question of priorities and deliveries on speed reducers is now in the hands of Jones Foundry, who will advise us as soon as they can determine the requirements.

Order #5- Dings Magnetic Separator Co. In connection with this order, we are awaiting advice from the factory regarding priority and delivery. This also applies to order #7.

Order #9- U.S.Rubber Co.- Conveyor Belt. The U.S. Rubber Company advises that the priority rating for the belt conveyor belt is satisfactory for delivery on June first as specified. MCCORMICK BUILDING 332 S. MICHIGAN AVE. CHIOAGO

Order #10- The Jeffrey Mfg. Co. Single Roll Crusher. We are awaiting advice from the factory as to whether shipment will be made by June 1st as specified.

Order #11- Major Equipment Co.- Control Board & Distribution Center. The delivery on an AA-3 can be made 6 weeks from receipt of drawings, which will give us ample time.

Order #12-& 13- General Electric Co., covering Motor generator set and starters. We are awaiting confirmation by the factory as to delivery and priority.

Order #14- Lincoln Elec. Co.- Switches. Priority and delivery are satisfactory.

Order #15- Jos. T. Ryerson & Sons advise that the priority rating is satisfactory and that they will deliver the reinforcing steel by the time specified.

This apparently indicates that in the majority of cases our priorities of AA=5 will permit delivery by July 1st, which is in keeping with our schedule. As soon as we receive replies from the various factories on orders #2, 4, 5, 7, 10, 12 and 13, we will advise you. We have been promised this information the forepart of this coming week. As it now stands in a majority of cases, no better priority is required, but of course, we could receive no promises that something might upset them at a later date.

Yours of February 27, file G-128, on application for waiver for use of steel in connection with coal preparation equipment at our Stansbury tipple, etc.:

The Allen & Garcia Company advise having sent you a copy of their drawing PD1, Job 1304, on March 1, which I trust will enable you to authorize the steel requested.

The Northwest is getting in terrible shape for coal and we must push the new Stansbury Mine forward as fast as possible; our requirements this year conservatively estimated at 6,000,000 tons, in fact our production for the first 2 months of 1943 ran 54.8% above the same period last year, when the railroad was doing a heavy business.

The Assistant Solid Fuels Coordinator at Seattle, Dr. J. B. Umpleby, is continuously pressing us to help with government deliveries and as a result of the mine explosion at the Montana Goal and Iron Company's Smith Mine at Washoe, Montana, the Northern Pacific Railroad, who have been purchasing fuel coal from the Smith Mine, are asking for 200,000 tons of coal from Wyoming which they will not be able to obtain, either wholly or in part.

We are driving two ventilation headings now in coal 8'6" high at the Stansbury Mine and will get out about 4,000 tons of development coal per month, which, while not first class, will be applied on the commercial market where it can be used.

May I suggest, in all kindness, that compelled as we are to run the gamut of a dozen offices with continual delays and inquiries, we are terribly handicapped, our engineering and operating

forces badly reduced, working day and night to try to make the progress which will enable us to get the Stansbury Mine into production this fall. Therefore I would appreciate anything you can do to expedite these matters.

In order to conform with certain rules and regulations of manufacturers, War Production Board, etc., it was necessary for us to receive an order from you direct on certain items which are indicated as being made out to the Allen & Garcia Company, namely, such orders as you could place direct, Nos. 1, 3, 5, 11 and 15, could be issued direct by you to the supplier, but would have to be on the basis of a confirming order. It was our thought that in order to avoid any difficulties, it probably would be best if you could place all the orders issued with us direct, as we have in turn issued our orders to the various companies, without getting your direct confirmation. As the time was limited, we did not have an opportunity to follow in full our usual procedure. We were successful, however, in obtain two bids in most cases, but as ceiling prices prevail, the competition obtained was not very active.

There are numerous minor items such as sash, cement, sand, stone, bolts, rivets and stair treads, that we have not attempted to cover on, being assured that we can obtain them when necessary and we have not placed orders for the covering until we can determine just what kind is available and preferred, not being allowed to use corrugated steel. We are also convassing the market for used motors and we feel sure that it will not be possible to obtain totally enclosed motors, such as you have used on the other installations.

Under PD-200, Serial 43713, we were authorised to buy the certain equipment set forth in the attached Form PD-681, which we are required to file under Limitation Order L-193, covering conveying machinery.

We are going ahead as rapidly as possible with the construction of the new Stansbury Mine, our rock tunnel in some 350 feet. The main lead of the railroad tracks is now completed and ready for the delivery of material, including the timber required for the tunnel lining, which will enter transit about February 1st.

Our necessity for coal is growing steadily, our production last year, as I have heretofore stated to you, 5,283,000 tons, with every expectancy that we will need not less than 6 million tons in 1943. This estimate is well borne out by the fact that, in January, 1942, we produced 456,293 tons, while an estimate of production for January of this year, made today, indicates a production of 580,000 tons for the month. or an increase of 27 per cent.

Just at the present moment, if we had coal to spare, we could answer some of the very urgent appeals made by Covernment Quarternaster Department officials for coal for Western governmental activities. Yesterday we peddled out three cars to one of these places that was completely out of coal, and today I am taking 15 cars away from the Railroad, without the permission of its officials, to give to two other points that are almost out of fuel, without any promise from commercial mines. On top of this situation, yesterday's press dispatches indicate that fuel oil issues on the Pacific Coast have been ordered out 25 per cent by Secretary Tekes, which will add to the confusion and further demand for coal.

I am presenting this situation to you, illustrative of what we are up against in the way of fueling the Railroad and, if possible,
