



Instructions

- The Read with Me program is for children from birth until they enter kindergarten.
- Complete 8 activities in each column with your child and earn a prize!

- Saturday August 9 is the last day of Read with Me. Be sure to bring your booklet to the library by then to get all your prizes.

Early Literacy Activities get your child ready to read.

Research has shown that children must have these five experiences beginning at birth, so their brains and bodies are strong enough and ready for them to learn how to read and write when they enter school.

Children learn language and pre-reading skills by listening to their parents and others talk. They also need to be able to ask questions and talk about what they are thinking and feeling. Talking, listening, and thinking of what to say, exercise different parts of their brain.

Songs slow down language so children can hear the different sounds that make up words, especially rhymes, Songs are also a fun way to learn new and interesting words.

Reading together is the single most important way to help children get ready to read. It introduces new words and teaches them about the world. Children who are read to are more likely to want to learn to read, and read for the rest of their lives.

HABLAR

Los niños aprenden lenguaje y las habilidades de pre-lectura al escuchar mientras sus padres y otros conversan. También necesitan poder hacer preguntas y hablar de lo que están pensando y lo que se sienten. Las actividades de hablar, escuchar y pensar en qué decir ejercitan diferentes partes del cerebro.

Las canciones desaceleran el ritmo del lenguaje para que los niños puedan oir los distintos sonidos que forman palabras, especialmente las rimas. Las canciones son una manera divertida de aprender palabras nuevas e interesantes también.

Leer juntos es la manera más importante de ayudar a los piños a prepararse para leer. Los introduce a palabras nuevas y les enseña sobre el mundo. Los niños que leen son los niños que tienen más probabilidad de querer aprender a leer y luego leer por el resto de su vida

Writing is more difficult than reading and children need years of practice to get their fingers and minds ready. They must be able to organize their thoughts and know their letters and the sounds that they make.

PLAYING

Play helps children learn how to put their thoughts into words. It helps them combine what they are doing with what they are thinking and saying. Children learn through their 5 senses. Play allows them to explore and discover their world. Everyone always learns more when they are having fun!



ESCRIBIR

Escribir es más difícil que leer y los niños necesitan años de práctica para preparar los dedos y la mente. Necesitan poder organizar sus pensamientos y saber las letras del abecedario y los sonidos correspondientes.

La actividad de jugar ayuda a los niños a convertir sus pensamientos en palabras. Los ayuda a conectar lo que están haciendo con lo que están pensando y diciendo. Los niños anrenden a través de los 5 sentidos El jugar les da la oportunidad de explorar y descubrir su mundo. Todos aprendemos mejor cuando nos estamos divirtiendo.

Changes: Go BIG or go small




